How to get here

Camelot Holiday Park is located on the outskirts of Carlisle, in Sandysike, Cumbria.

There are excellent transport links nearby, Carlisle is situated on the M6 motorway and the West Coast Main line for rail services. Taxis are a 10-15 minute ride from the train station to the holiday park.

You can now also fly to Carlisle via the Carlisle Lake District Airport with direct flights from London, Dublin and Belfast. The airport is located just nine miles from Camelot Holiday Park.

Directions

If you are driving from the South follow the M6 North, taking junction 44 for Carlisle. Take the 4th exit on to the A7, travel for approximately 6 miles and Camelot Holiday Park is on the right.

From Scotland and the North follow the A74(M) to Gretna Green, then the A6071 to Longtown, then the A7 South towards Carlisle, Camelot Holiday Park is on the left approximately 1.5 miles south of Longtown.



Things to see and do

Around Carlisle

Longtown

Longtown is just 2 miles from Camelot Holiday Park. Longtown has a turbulent history that is very interesting when explored. It has a population of about 3000. Unlike many towns, which grew from smaller villages or settlements, Longtown was planned and built in the late 18th century.

Walby Farm Park

Enjoy a family day out at the award winning Walby Farm Park - a great day out for the whole family. Exciting outdoor play areas, lots of animal friends, including many rare breeds and Cumbria's biggest indoor play area.

Carlisle Castle

Standing proudly in the city it has dominated for nine centuries, Carlisle Castle remained a working fortress until well within living memory. It has withstood many sieges, contained a valuable royal prisoner, and been home to the King's Own Royal Border Regiment. Discover the castle's turbulent past in the fascinating family-friendly exhibition. Explore medieval castle rooms as well as 19th century military buildings, and visit Cumbria's Museum of Military Life.

Carlisle Cathedral

Carlisle Cathedral is one of the jewels of North West England and, after standing on the border with Scotland for almost 900 years, it has a lively story to tell. It may not be the best known medieval Cathedral in England, it is certainly not the biggest, but it delights its many visitors.

Tullie House Museum

and Art Gallery One of the top places to visit in Carlisle, Tullie House, where historic collections, contemporary art and family fun are brought together in one impressive museum and art gallery.



Carlisle Race Course

Carlisle Racecourse is a thoroughbred horse racing venue located at Blackwell village, near Carlisle, Cumbria, England. The course has been on its present site since 1904, when it moved there from another location near Carlisle. The course is 1m 4f (2.41km) in circumference, right handed, and hosts flat racing in the summer and National Hunt racing over the winter months.

Kielder Water & Forest Park

Kielder Water & Forest Park brings you nature on a grander scale. The views are bigger, the night sky brighter, the sports wilder and the smiles wider. Home to the biggest man-made lake in Northern Europe and, at over 250 square miles, the largest working forest in England.

Hadrian's Wall

Hadrian's Wall is a spectacular World Heritage Site, marching 73 miles from sea to sea across some of the wildest and most dramatic countryside in England. Explore ruined forts, museums and a Roman town along the wall to find out more about life on the northern frontier.

Talkin Tarn Country Park

Talkin Tarn Country Park lies nine miles east of Carlisle and two miles south of Brampton on the B6413 Castle Carrock road. There is a 65 acre lake set amid 120 acres of farmland and woodland. The tarn is an ideal place for active recreation or a quiet stroll through the mature woodlands.

Solway Aviation Museum

Solway Aviation Museum is home to a collection of aircraft, aviation artefacts and displays reflecting Britain's position as a world leader in aircraft design and innovation at the dawn of the jet age. The museum's primary objective is the preservation of our Aviation heritage, its display and interpretation. Take a nostalgic journey back to Wartime Cumberland and the men and women of the RAF who served in WWII.
